

# Cuisine and Local Industry



"Kurodasho Wagyu" refers to pedigreed Tajima cattle raised in the Kurodasho area of Nishiwaki City, most of which are certified as "Kobe Beef." Nishiwaki City practices eco-friendly "recycling-oriented agriculture" by composting waste from Kurodasho Wagyu cattle and using it to fertilize Yamada-Nishiki rice and other crops.



Banshu Ramen, the soul food of Nishiwaki residents, is a soysauce-based ramen characterized by its slightly sweet broth. After World War II, during the boom of the local Banshu textile industry, Banshu Ramen was created with its distinctive flavor to suit the tastes of women who had come from across Japan for group employment.



Nishiwaki City is the production hub of Yamada-Nishiki, known as the king of sake rice, and offers many premium sake brands made with locally produced Yamada-Nishiki. We promote rice cultivation and sake brewing under the philosophy of "terroir," where nature and climate combine to produce exceptional sake.



Nishiwaki City is promoting the Sweets Factory Support Project, which assists new farmers through strawberry cultivation, aiming to establish strawberries as a specialty and revitalize the region. The city has many strawberry farms where visitors can enjoy strawberry picking from January to May.



Banshu-ori

Banshu-ori, a local industry of Nishiwaki City, is a textile made using a technique where threads are dyed first and then woven.

By varying the combination of warp and weft threads, Banshu-ori achieves intricate and sophisticated patterns. Its beauty and exceptional quality have made it a popular choice for fabrics used by top brands in Japan and worldwide. Its appeal lies in its deep, rich colors, textures, and pleasantly soft feel.
